

Breast Cancer Facts



General US population

1 in 8 American Women Diagnosed

Most Common Cancer in US Women (Except Skin Cancers)

Accounts for 30% (1 in 3) of New Female Cancers

IMPORTANT: For Native American Population...

Cancer Deaths Drop in Every Other Demographic Group

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC):

- Rising in Native American Women
- Rising Nearly 2 Percent Yearly Among Native Women in Their 40s

Longer to Diagnose: One of the Lowest Screening Rates in the Country

Abnormal Results: Less Likely to Pursue Confirmation Biopsy

Mainly Occurs in Middle Aged Women, Median Diagnosis 62 Years Old



Breast Cancer Occurs When Cells Grow Out of Control & Form Tumors



Breast Cancer Spreads By:

Invading Nearby Tissues

Through the Lymphatic System/Blood



Risk Factors

Uncontrolled Risk Factors:

- 1. Women
- 2. Aging
- 3. Genetics

Controlled Risk Factors:

- 1. Smoking & Alcohol Consumption
- 2. Physical Inactivity & Overweight
- 3. Hormone Consumption



Four Types of Breast Cancer

Ductal Carcinoma in Situ (DCIS): Early & Non-Invasive, Occurs in Milk Ducts

Invasive Ductal Carcinoma (IDC): Most Common that Occurs When Abnormal Cells Spread Beyond the Milk Ducts

Inflammatory Breast Cancer (IBC): Rare Fast-Growing that Occurs When Cancer Cells Block Lymph Vessels in the Skin

Invasive Lobular Carcinoma (ILC): Second Most Common



Subtypes of Breast Cancer



Paget's Disease of the Breast: Uncommon Type that Causes Changes to the Skin of the Nipple

Metaplastic Breast Cancer: Several Subtypes, Including Squamous, Spindle Cell, and Adenosquamous Cell

Phyllodes Tumor: Rare Type of Abnormality that Can Be Benign, Borderline, or Malignant



Signs & Symptoms

Nipple Changes: Flattened, Pulls Inward, Rash

Nipple Discharge: ANY Discharge Other Than Breast Milk

Skin Changes: Dimpling, Redness, Flaky Skin, Scaling

Breast Changes: Size or Shape in One or Both Breasts

Pain: In Breast or Armpit Area That Does Not Go Away

Lumps: In Breast & Armpit Area

Screening Mammogram

Non-Invasive Detailed X-Ray Imaging Procedure

Minimum 4 views

Low-Dose Radiation Technique

Detects Breast Cancer & Other Diseases

Duration ~20 Minutes








BRCA Genetic Testing

- Gene Mutations BRCA or Breast Cancer Gene
- Normal Cells Can Become Cancer Because of Mutation in Genes
- 1 in 10 (10%) Breast Cancers Linked With Known Inherited Abnormal Genes
- Family History May Have Inherited an Abnormal Gene
- Does Not Always Show on Genetic Test
- Most Develop (about 90%) from Unidentified Acquired Changes
- Mutation Occurs During Patient's Life
- Most Causes Unknown








Case A: RT Breast


