Radiology Department Earns 3-Year Mamography Accreditation

The Oneida Comprehensive Health Division Radiology Department has earned a three-year term of accreditation in mammography as the result of a recent review by the American College of Radiology® (ACR). Mammography is a specific type of imaging test that uses a low-dose X-ray system to examine breasts. A mammography exam, called a mammogram, is used to aid in the early detection and diagnosis of breast diseases in women.

To receive accreditation, facilities must meet professional testing criteria relating to items such as clinical image quality and phantom image quality. The ACR gold seal of accreditation represents the highest level of image quality and patient safety. It is awarded only to facilities meeting specific standards as part of a peer-review evaluation by board-certified physicians and medical physicists who are experts in the field.

2025 DRAFT IMPACTS



Is your immunity "on the clock"?

With the 2025 Draft coming to Green Bay at the end of April, Oneida Comprehensive Health Division, Brown County and the City of De Pere are encouraging all people living in the area to review their protection against the measles virus. The event will draw thousands of visitors from across the country and world, including areas with measles outbreaks.

Measles symptoms include high fever, diarrhea, coughing, runny nose, and eye and ear infections, followed by a rash that starts on the face or hairline and spreads down the body. The disease can have serious complications, especially in young children. One in five children who contract measles will be hospitalized, and one in 20 will develop pneumonia. Amid the current outbreaks, the CDC says one child has died from measles and an adult death is under investigation.

The best way to protect yourself from the measles virus is to get the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine, which provides about 93% protection after the first dose and 97% after the second dose. Will I be able to access the Health Center?

With the 2025 Draft being hosted in Green Bay at the end of April, Oneida Comprehensive Health Division (OCHD) is advising all patients to plan ahead as road closures and traffic pattern changes are expected throughout the month. These changes are in preparation for the event, which will take place April 24-26 and impact access to the health center and surrounding areas. To avoid disruptions to care and minimize delays, patients are encouraged to prepare in advance.

Patients using the pharmacy are encouraged to pay close attention to their medication quantity as the 2025 Draft approaches to avoid any delays in refills. To prevent delays, the pharmacy recommends that all medication refill requests be submitted by Tuesday, April 15, and that medications are picked up no later than Friday, April 18.

Individuals with appointments at the Oneida Community Health Center during the week of April 21 should allow extra travel time to navigate potential traffic delays, road closures and rerouting. Patients in the Green Bay area are urged to be mindful of high-traffic areas when planning their routes to the Oneida Community Health Center.

An improved Patient Health Portal was designed to enhance convenience and empower patients to take charge of their medical and behavioral health care. This user-friendly portal offers several benefits, including:

- Pre-registration for appointments from your device — no need to wait in line

Are You Eligible for FREE Health Care Programs?

At Oneida Comprehensive Health, we understand that healthcare can sometimes require specialized services, and that's where purchased referred care (PRC) comes in. While PRC is not insurance, it is a financial resource that can assist in covering the cost of services that may not be directly available at our facility. That's why it's important to ensure that your PRC information is up-to-date every year.

PRC funds are only accessible after all alternative resources, such as insurance, have been utilized. If you are unsure whether you qualify for PRC, we can help you determine your eligibility based on federal guidelines along with a referral from your primary care provider at the health center or behavioral health.

If you don't have insurance, you only have Medicare Part A or Medicare Part A and B, you may qualify for several free programs that can help with healthcare costs, and signing up before you need them can help speed up the reimbursement process.

There are various free Medicaid programs available to assist with healthcare needs:

Specified Low Income Medicare Beneficiary: Patient must have Medicare Part A & B – program pays for Medicare premiums on behalf of member, member still pays for co-pay, co-insurance and deductibles.

Family Planning Only Services: Covered services are contraceptives, pap tests, voluntary sterilizations and treatments for STDs.

Wisconsin Well Woman: Costs for breast and cervical cancer screenings including exams and mammograms, paps, pelvic exams and HPV tests in addition to Multiple Sclerosis.

SeniorCare: Assistance with prescription drug coverage.

Badger Care Plus: Typically covers most health care costs including prescription drugs.

Qualified Medicare Beneficiary: Patient must have Medicare Part A & B – program pays for Medicare premiums on behalf of member but also co-pays, co-insurance and deductibles.

To find out if you're eligible, our Medical Benefit Coordinators, Gary and Amy, are available Monday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. in the former registration area of the clinic or by calling (920) 869-2711 and selecting option 5. They can help screen you for these programs and answer any questions you might have about these benefits.



AHEALTHY HISTORY



ONEIDA HEALER NANCY CORNELIUS SKENANDORE

Born on June 13, 1861, on the Oneida Reservation in Wisconsin to Elijah and Elizabeth Jordan Cornelius, Nancy's journey as a healer began with her education at esteemed institutions, including the Carlisle Indian School in Pennsylvania and the Hartford Training School for Nurses in Connecticut. She was among the earliest trained nurses to practice in the state. She graduated from nursing school only two years after Wisconsin's first school of nursing was established in 1888.



Nancy began her career providing private nursing in patients' homes while living in Connecticut. After joining the Oneida Hospital on September 5, 1899, she became a cornerstone of community health, often serving as both nurse and administrator in an era when trained medical professionals were scarce. Her role was particularly critical during times when the hospital lacked a resident physician, providing essential care and support to those in need. Nancy left the hospital in 1904, after marrying Daniel Skenandore. Her legacy highlights the vital role that women played in the preservation and advancement of Oneida health practices.
